The year has Seen an extraorumary increase in the sales of articles made by the pupils, mainly baskets cane seats for chairs and various kinds of ncedlework the total receipts from such sales having been \$557. A very large amount of printing on outside orders has also been done, the excellent quality of which is no doubt indicated by the annual report itself, which is fully up to the standard for suca publications.

The cust must paying pupils for a certain percentage of their work is said to have proved an inspiration, in quality and theracter of their work. The report states that the industrial training privileges are not restricted to emplied children, but are also open to adults.

Attention is called to the aisadvartageous conditions which result from cramped guarters and the peed of money for a new building is strongly emphasized. The recessary site, free of incumoranes, has been secured, but it is estimated that a building such as is

needed will cost \$100,000.

The building planned will provide only for the class of builds at present accommodated, all of whom are taken to and from the school daily by omnibus a service that cost \$22; the past year, Ultimately it is intended to add to the building, in order to afford living accommodations for a certain number of whose physical cripples. condition would prevent their transportation back and forth every day. There is also a desite to take more pupils who now live at a distance from Boston.

On Oct 1 the school contained 44 pupils. a gain of six since a year ago. Legacies to the amount of Sis 200 have been re-

ceived during the year.
