The Magic of iMovie and Keynote

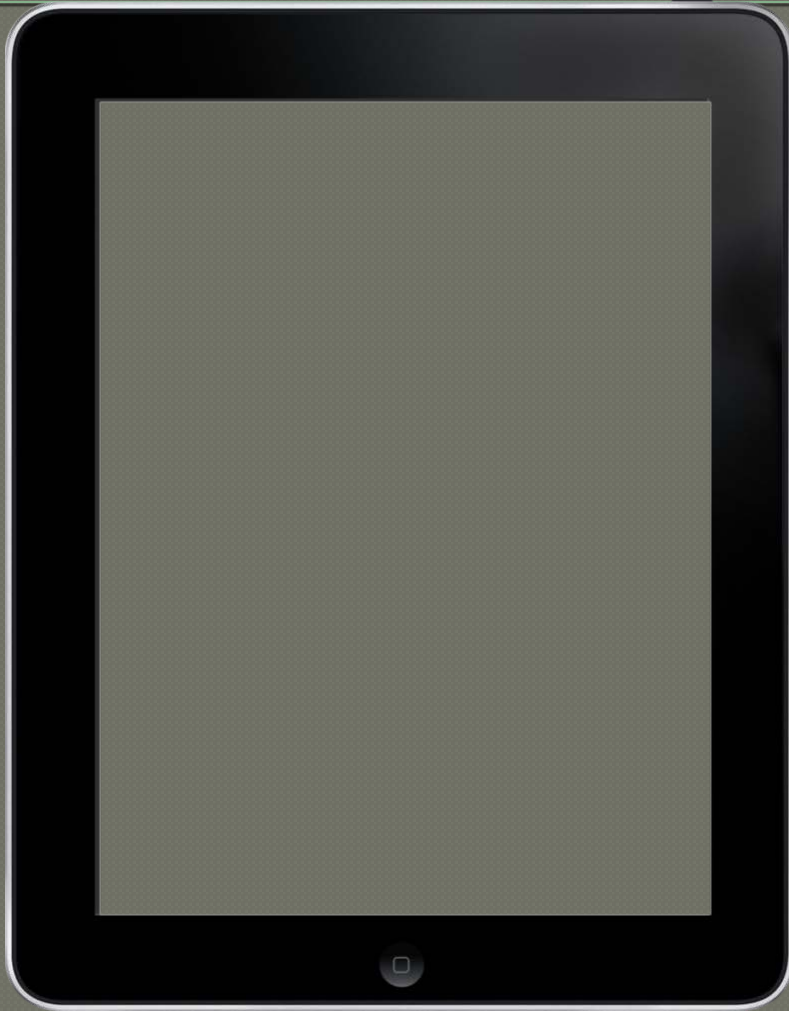
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Goals Today:

- To demonstrate how to use and create movies using iMovie

- To discuss how these two apps can be used together for a variety of purposes including creation of social stories
- To discuss how to set up remote access as well as ways this can potentially maximize independence for students in a variety of settings.
- To review a case study of a student who utilized this combination of Assistive Technology tools

Some Tools



Case Study

- Young man approaching adulthood, knows what to do; has difficulty initiating tasks.
- Needs verbal cues to continue each step of a task.
- Staff and family are trying to decrease his prompt dependency on people (aka increase his independence!)
- Seeking a tool that can serve as a prompt him in lieu of requiring a person to offer verbal cues, prompts, and encouragement

Introductions:

- This young man has some limited verbal output, and also has an AAC device that he can be successful with.
- He will not initiate communication interactions using his device, but he will use it to respond if someone uses it with him to talk with him first.

Challenges:

- How do we get this young man to be as independent as possible?
- What does maximum independence look like for him?

Impressions:

- He has become very prompt dependent on the people around him.

Future Concerns

Transitioning into a work setting

- How will he function and be independent in a work or dayhab setting?
- How will he get his needs met in a new setting, with new staff?

Discussion:

What has been tried for him.

1. Pictello

- a. In Slideshow mode, the directions and story just continued to go on its own.
- b. The student enjoyed hitting the buttons to hear the information and progress the slides.
- c. Some pages incorporated use of videos for video modeling.

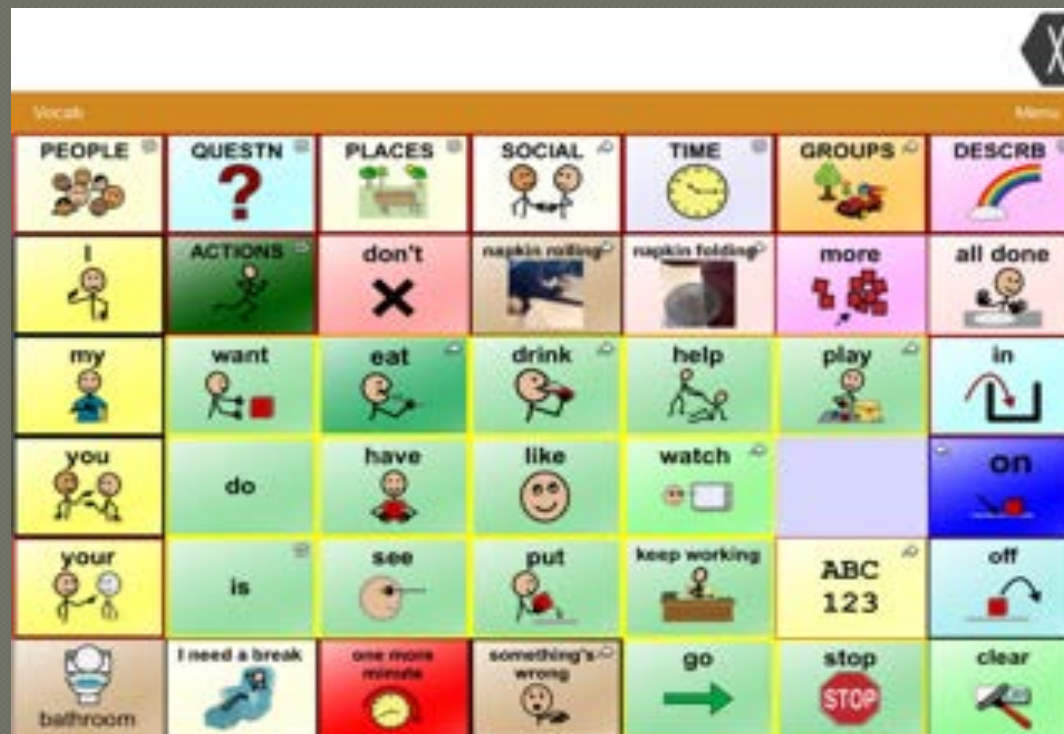
2. Voice App



Discussion:

What has been tried for him

3. Touch Chat with WordPower



Findings:

- This student does initiate pressing buttons on various apps to see what the next step is (without prompts)

However,

- This does not prompt him to do the next step.
- He requires continued verbal and/or gestural prompts from staff to engage in the task

If only.....

- What if he could be cued to do each step of the task as he was ready to do it, rather than in a timed sequence like Pictello
- What if his iPad could be remotely controlled to give him the support he needs without being right next to him
- If only there were a way to do this!

WIDEOUT

“Life Coach Helmet”

- This is what we’re trying to do for so many of our students! But because this helmet doesn’t exist, we have to use other tools

Abracadabra: A way to do this!

- Keynote + iMovie = Life Coach Helmet*

- Task: Folding pizza boxes at Whole Foods (with iMovie)
- Task: Clean-up from snack (without iMovie)
- Demos
- Demo with Remote Access using iPhone

Other Possible Ways this Combination of Tools can be a Support to Students

- Memory
- Initiation
- Social story (self-regulation, peer interactions, experience at the doctor's office)
- Literacy tool (Interactive book reports)
- Story Re-telling
- Step by step directions to learn a task
